The First Fort de la Présentation.

In his work, The Documentary History of the State of New York, E.B. O'Callaghan wrote that by October 20, 1749, the settlement of la Présentation consisted of a fort of palisades, a house, a barn, a stable and an oven.

On November 21, 1748, Abbe Francois Picquet (1708-1781), a Sulpician missionary selected a site for a mission at the confluence of St Lawrence and Oswegatchie Rivers.

The date was significant as a Catholic feast day, the Présentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary in the Temple. The mission was named la Présentation.

In May of 1749, Abbe Picquet arrived at la Présentation with a contingent of Laurentian Iroquois, some laborers, a stone mason, and a few French soldiers. Once the land was cleared, a storehouse was built, followed by a small fort of pickets with small houses that serve as bastions.


Picquet celebrated the first Mass at the mission in June 1749. The mission was established for religious reasons, but the Fort indicated its military value. To have a fort at la Présentation, it would be easy to have a force there in case of need to dispatch to Choueguen (Oswego) or intercept any English and Indians who may penetrate the Colony.

Shortly after the founding of the mission, English allied League Iroquois recognized the strategic significance of the settlement as well.

On October 26, 1749, a force of natives "believed to be Mohawks" burned the settlement to the ground, only Abbe Picquet's house was saved, apparently by the efforts of Abenaki warriors attached to the mission.



War of 1812: 2nd Battle of Ogdensburgh "The Winter Battle"



hen the war of 1812 broke out, a flourishing illicit trade was soon established between Ogdensburg and Prescott, Canada, the site of the British Fort Wellington, on the Northern side of the Saint Lawrence River. This was checked early in October 1812 when the Americans reinforced the local militia with some of the regular 1st U.S. Rifle Regiment under Major Benjamin Forsyth, who occupied a fort (formerly Fort La Présentation) and barracks alongside the Oswegatchie River at the western edge of the town.

On February 21, 1813, Lieutenant General Sir George Prevost, the British Governor General of Canada, appointed local Lieutenant Colonel "Red George" MacDonell as commandant of British troops in Prescott and left him instructions that he was to attack Ogdensburg only if the Americans weakened their garrison.

The reinforcements, although there temporarily, allowed MacDonnell to improvise an attack against Ogdensburg. He planned for a company of the Glengarry Light Infantry, 70 militia and some light guns mounted on sleighs to make a frontal attack on the fort which housed Forsyth's riflemen. The main column, consisting of 120 men of the 8th (King's), 30 of the Royal Newfoundland Fencibles and 230 of the local militia flank companies, would cross the river lower down and attack from the flank.
